This reading seminar offers graduate students in History and allied disciplines a grounding in comparative methodology as well as a topical survey of the development of the U.S. and German political economies from unification/reunification in the 1870s to the near-present. Where the English-language literature permits and the topic warrants, we will give attention to both East and West Germany after WWII. Topics tentatively include the following:

- the American and German styles of federalism
- varieties of capitalism (from the Second Industrial Revolution to the 1980s)
- labor movements
- competition policy (antitrust, cartels)
- imperialism
- consumerism
- automobility
- New Deal/Nazi-era economic policy
- business and labor in World War II
- environmental movements
- corporate governance (including co-determination)

Reading knowledge of German is not required. Written requirements consist of periodic, brief analyses of assigned readings, and a comparative, historiographic paper surveying the literature on a topic of special interest to the student.
