### HISTORY 755: ISSUES IN SOUTHEAST ASIAN HISTORY BEFORE 1800

Located between the Chinese and Indic civilizations, Southeast Asia has been a region of striking diversity where indigenous cultures encountered and were enriched by the world's major influences (from major religions like Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, and Confucianism to Westernization) for more than two thousand years. Yet what makes the region distinctive is the subtle commonality of local polities and cultures. The complex traditions which have shaped the history of the region are very much alive today despite colonization and Westernization since the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

This class explores major themes and topics in the history of the region before 1800 rather than a chronology or narrative of major events in individual countries. No prior knowledge is required. Nonetheless, students are expected to work hard to help themselves familiar with basic names, events, and chronology, especially of the countries of their interest. The enthusiasm to learn other cultures and to study the unfamiliar, thus difficult, materials, is required. Imagination is needed.
