## History 837: Modern British Historiography

The seminar introduces students to some of the principal topics in the historiography of modern imperial Britain. Using both older and more recent work, we will look at the types of questions that have animated research in the field and the various approaches that historians have used to answer them. Readings are organized both chronologically and thematically, and cover topics such as (but not limited to) state and government, political economy, imperial expansion and rule, gender and sexuality, the emergence of the modern self, class and its politics, liberalism, and welfarism. The seminar is based on reading and discussion. Course requirements include: analytical presentations and the introduction of questions for discussion (as needed depending on enrollment; at least once per student), two short historiographic papers, 5 pp. each, based on material discussed in class (October 25 and November 22; the papers could be based on your oral presentations, or on any other week's readings), and one longer essay (10-12pp.) due Thursday, December 15, 4:00 pm. In addition, there will be an online discussion board, to which each student will contribute a short paragraph or question.
