Seminar in Modern French History

This course will focus on key issues in the political, social and cultural history of France in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Particular attention will be given to contemporary historiographical debates (on both sides of the Atlantic) on such topics as rural history in the nineteenth century or the Vichy régime.

<u>Requirements</u>: Two short (5-7 pages) review essays and one long paper (15-20 pages) on a topic to be agreed upon with the instructor. Those with an adequate knowledge of French will be required to review French language books. Students will also be responsible for leading at least one discussion in tandem with another student.

Starred books are available for purchase at the University Bookstore. All books are on 3 hour reserve in Helen C. White Library. Most articles can be downloaded as PDF files through Madcat (just look up the name of the periodical and then track down the volume number); articles not available in this format have been placed on Electronic Reserves (EC).
